Home Learning Policy

Purpose

The aim of our home learning policy is to promote learning beyond the school day as an essential part of good education. We believe that home learning not only reinforces classroom learning, it also helps children and young people to develop skills and attitudes that they need to be successful lifelong learners.

Role of teachers and parents/carers in supporting children

There is an explicit requirement to address home learning in the home-school agreement.

The headteacher will ensure that home learning is:

- an integral part of the curriculum and is planned and prepared alongside all other programmes of learning
- appropriate to the age, ability and circumstances of the pupils, taking into account special educational needs
- coordinated in order to be manageable for children and families

Teachers will ensure that:

- pupils and parents are given a home learning timetable through class newsletters sent by email and available on the school website, indicating when home learning is due for completion
- home learning is set in line with guidance and agreed standards
- tasks are structured and their purpose explained to pupils ensuring they understand the task
- it is clear to pupils how their home learning consolidates and extends the work they are doing in school

How parents can help

The role of parents in working with and supporting their children is very important in a variety of ways:

- Provide a reasonably peaceful, suitable place where your child/children can work alone, or more often for younger children, together with an adult
- Make it clear to your children that you value the home learning they do, and support the school by explaining why home learning will help their learning
- Praise your children when they have completed their home learning
- Decide, as a family, when it is a good time for home learning to be attempted
- Discuss the work with your child, decide together if your help is needed and what form it might take
- Communicate with the teacher if the work is too hard.

Equality of opportunity

While most tasks can be differentiated, time does not allow us to give individual home learning tasks and children are encouraged to do as much as they are able. We welcome parent feedback about the amount of help their child has needed. We will make every effort to combat disadvantage, for example by being prepared to allow parents and children after school access to resources such as ICT or providing paper copies of resources where necessary.

Current expectations

Reading

Every child is provided with a Kirtlington Primary School Reading Record. This record includes tips and questions to support parents at home in helping their children to read. They are part of a school wide initiative to improve standards in reading by helping parents/carers to have access to the type of questioning we use during Reciprocal Reading sessions in school. Asking questions about the text is a great way to develop your child's skills in inference and textual understanding. Reading certificates are presented during the Friday Celebration Assembly.

Daily reading is recommended for all primary age children for the following times:

- Reception – 5 minutes daily
- Y1-2 – 10 minutes daily
- Y3-4 – 20 minutes daily
- Y5-6 – 30 minutes daily

For children in Reception to Year 3, we ask parents to sign and date reading records. Reading skills will be taught as part of the weekly timetable.

Children in Y4-6 are expected to fill in their own reading record regularly (under the supervision of a parent) with date, title of the book they are reading and a note of the pages read. The children are also encouraged to write comments about the books they have read.

Spelling

We use the Spelling Shed programme from EdShed for both classwork and home learning. Spellings and spelling rules are taught in class and every child in Y1-Y6 will be set weekly spellings to learn at home through the Spelling Shed online resource. Children should access Spelling Shed at least three times per week. Spellings are set on a Tuesday for a test the following Monday. Parents are encouraged to contact us if they experience any problems accessing the programme.

Mathematics

We use Mathletics for home learning. Children in Y2-6 are set regular activities throughout the term that tie in with the work they are doing in class.

Times Tables

We use Times Tables Rock Stars for times tables practice. Children in Y3-6 are set specific tables to focus on and are also able to access free play areas. Children should access Times Tables Rock Stars at least three times per week.

Main home learning activity

A home learning grid of activities is given to the children each term, along with an exercise book. Children can earn house points for completing a range of activities which support the term's topic and cross curricular learning. All home learning should be returned at the end of the term and a celebration display will be made for parents and children to see.

Children in Year 6 will be set additional work to support their SATs, using in the form of CGP workbooks. In the summer term Y6 children may receive more home learning in order to prepare them for secondary school.

We expect children to maintain the same standards of presentation for home learning as we set in school, for example to use their best handwriting and a sharp pencil or black pen.

The work should always have been explained and discussed in class before coming home. It is our intention, and good practice, not to send work home that the child cannot do already i.e. parents are not expected to teach new skills.

Feedback to children/parents

We endeavour to give feedback to children about their home learning and opportunities to share their work with the wider school community through open afternoons. Stickers and house points are allocated for the completion of activities.

Monitoring arrangements

The Curriculum Committee of the Governing Body will monitor feedback from pupils and parents.

Consultation

Parents (through the parent questionnaire) are consulted about home learning.
